Getting Ready Together

The Transition Period is Real

Your child may:

- eat more or less than usual
- nap differently or refuse naps
- cry more at drop-off
- seem extra tired or clingy at home

This does not mean anything is wrong. It simply means your child is adjusting to a new routine, new people, and a new environment. Consistency, patience, and trust go a long way during this stage.

Be Prepared for Sickness

One of the most common parts of starting daycare is an increase in everyday illnesses, especially during the first year.

As children adjust to a group setting, they are exposed to more germs than they may have been before. While we follow strong cleaning and health practices, occasional colds, fevers, and runny noses are simply part of early childhood in a school setting.

Daycare is Different Than One-on-One Care

Even with low teacher-to-child ratios, daycare is different from having a nanny or one-on-one care at home.

In a classroom setting, teachers are caring for your child with warmth and attention while also balancing the needs of the group as a whole. We absolutely get to know each child individually, but we also have to be mindful of classroom flow, routines, supervision, and the needs of all children in our care. That shared environment is also where so much beautiful growth happens.

Routines May Change

When children start daycare, routines at home may shift too. Sleep, eating, separation, and overall energy levels can all look a little different in the beginning. Some children need more rest, some eat differently, and some need extra closeness after school. This is all part of transition and usually settles with time.
